THIRTIETH REPORT OF THE SPECIAL MASTERS/TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Herman J. Weber, Senior Judge, United States District Court:

Your Special Masters/Trustees respectfully present their thirtieth periodic report, covering activities from October 9, 2008 to April 15, 2009. This report is submitted fifteen days prior to the status hearing before the Court scheduled for April 30, 2009.

I. PATIENT BENEFIT FUND

A. <u>Supervisory Panel.</u> The research project for ACES to study the BSCC heart valve sound recordings made on patients who participated in the imaging studies at Stanford and Beaumont has been completed. Unfortunately, the quality of the imaging study recordings was not at a level which permitted ACES to successfully analyze the acoustic signals of the heart valves therein. The panel is waiting on the outcome of the study by Dr. J. de Hart of HemoLab Cardiovascular Engineering in The Netherlands entitled "Outlet strut vibratory response study of BSCC valves at disc-strut closure impact" prior to considering possible next steps with ACES. The purpose of that study is to conduct in vitro research on seven BSCC heart valves, including the valve which had been implanted in a sheep at BioSurg, but was misclassified. The results of Phase I (static study of valves in air) of the study are expected in April, 2009.

The Supervisory Panel received a proposal from MedicAlert to provide emergency alert services to class members in Europe. After discussions with representatives from MedicAlert and with counsel, the Panel decided not pursue the proposal at this time because the Panel is still hopeful of developing a device or method that will give class members important information about the status of their valves and funds need to be preserved for this research.

A renewal agreement for the Penn State University, Hershey Imaging Program was approved by the Court on October 27, 2008 for a period of an additional six months or until the \$160,000 funding authorized by the Court is expended. As of February 28, 2009, the balance of funds remaining for this program was \$65,338. The Panel has recommended another six-month extension of this program.

In December 2008, Drs. Harrison and Weyman and the Chair of the Supervisory Panel along with John Johnson made an on-site visit to Hershey Medical Center. As a result of that visit, the Panel is in preliminary discussions with Hershey regarding Hershey's review of cine fluoroscopy films of BSCC heart valve patients.

In October 2008, Class Counsel requested that the panel consider posting a list of high-risk valves on the Bowling Pfizer website. After review of the materials submitted, the Panel decided not to post such a list as it is the Panel's position that such a list would undermine the guidelines and create confusion for the vast majority of class members who do not qualify for payment of surgical benefits under the guidelines.

At the April 30, 2008 hearing with the Court, the Court requested that the Trustees investigate the ramifications of indemnification by the Trust of the parties who are not otherwise protected by insurance in the event that the trust funds dwindle to the extent that indemnification is meaningless. The Trustees analyzed this issue and determined that commercial insurance should be investigated. The Trustees have investigated commercial insurance and have submitted several

applications for insurance. In each instance, the carriers either declined to provide coverage for the members of the Supervisory Panel or imposed such exclusions from their proposed coverage as to make the coverage pointless in relation to eliminating the risk of indemnification of the members of the Panel by the Trust. At this time the Trustees are not optimistic that satisfactory insurance can be obtained for the members of the Supervisory Panel. The Trustees will pursue this matter if circumstances change and a carrier is located that will provide coverage for the members of the Supervisory Panel. The Trustees will continue to report to the Court on the status of this matter.

- B. <u>Guidelines.</u> Drs. Harrison, Ibrahim and Ivey regularly monitor the pertinent world-wide literature and review reported events occurring to class members to ensure that any issues which may impact the guidelines are detected and considered by the full panel. They have found no information indicating the need to change the Guidelines at this time.
- C. <u>Research.</u> Our report on the status of the research program of the Supervisory Panel is set out in the attached Appendix 1.
- D. <u>Imaging.</u> Since the imaging program at Penn State resumed again, effective April 26, 2005, there have been eleven imaging sessions for seven implantees who may qualify for valve replacement surgery. One implantee was imaged three times and two implantees were imaged two times during this period.
- E. <u>Repository</u>. The Supervisory Panel maintains a repository of certain documents and information concerning the BSCC heart valve. The repository contains reports on the results of research sponsored by the Supervisory Panel, minutes of meetings of the Supervisory Panel, a bibliography of published literature regarding the BSCC heart valves, certain unpublished reports prepared by Dr. Ron Brookmeyer of his statistical analysis, the <u>Bowling</u> Settlement Agreement, and other information. The repository is available electronically in a database. Some of the information, such as published articles are not available for review due to copyright and other intellectual

property concerns. To access the on-line repository, an individual need only contact the Trustees' office for the website address and a password.

F. Website. The Supervisory Panel's website continues to be found at www.bowling-pfizer.com. It provides basic information on the parties involved (biographies, addresses, telephone numbers, email, etc.), certain orders of the Court including the Guidelines, the Settlement Agreement, Trustee Reports and a bibliography of relevant articles as well as other important information. The panel prepared a summary of key studies which is intended to provide a more user-friendly bibliography. This user-friendly bibliography is available on the website. A copy of the most recent "hit report" of the Supervisory Panel's website is attached to this Report as Appendix 2.

G. Valve Replacement Surgery Claims and Fracture Claims.

The Claims Administrator continues to receive and process claims for valve replacement surgery and outlet strut fracture. Some of the claimants have elected other courses of action rather than to receive the Settlement benefits.

From the beginning there have been 98 (74 foreign) qualified outlet strut fracture claims and 99 (39 foreign) qualified valve replacement surgery claims other than single leg fracture claims. In addition, there have been 39 (16 foreign) single leg fracture claims.

The office of the Claims Administrator continues to fulfill requests to calculate estimated annual fracture rates under the 2007 Guidelines and to respond to other inquiries from and on behalf of Class Members.

II. FINANCIAL INFORMATION

At December 31, 2008, the total balance of cash and cash equivalents was \$21,880,946.

Attached as Appendix 3 are a summary of the status of funding for the Settlement and five related schedules.

Attached as Appendix 4 are the following: an unaudited balance sheet as of December 31, 2008 and an unaudited statement of income and funds balance for the year ended December 31, 2008 (which includes the budgeted amounts for expenses for the administrative office for the year ended December 31, 2008).

Attached as Appendix 5 is a copy of the Independent Auditors' Report for the year ended December 31, 2007.

III. COMMUNICATIONS

Communications remain open, whether with physicians, Class Members, other BSCC heart valve implantees, Class Counsel, Special Counsel, Defendant's Counsel, or Counsel for Public Citizen.

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Status of Funding for the Settlement

December 31, 2008

Overall Status of Funding

Schedule 1 herewith presents the status of funding for all categories of expenditures of the Settlement. The total of the remaining amount column represents the total assets of the Settlement Fund as of December 31, 2008.

Status of Administration Expenses

The 20 year anticipated budget for administration expenses prepared in September 2004 which was prior to, independent of, the Supervisory Panel's plan for continuing operation (COP). The anticipated budget amounts for the years 2005 through 2009 were generally based upon the level of expenses at the time of and preceding the preparation of the budget in September 2004. It would have been appropriate to have provided a reserve for contingencies. However, it was considered that the overall budget amounts may be adequate to cover unknown contingencies. Schedule 2 herewith presents the budget for administration expenses for the twenty years 2005 through 2024. This schedule was included in the COP as SCHEDULE I.

Schedule 3 herewith presents the actual expenses for 2005 through 2008 and the remaining budgeted amounts through 2024.

Schedule 4 herewith presents a comparison of the actual administration expenses with the budgeted amounts for the period January 1, 2005 through December 31, 2008. As the schedule indicates, the actual expenses are under the budgeted expenses by \$2,657,400 for that time period.

Status of Research Expenses

Schedule 5 herewith presents an overall comparison of the actual research expenses with those set out in the COP. More detailed information regarding the research expenses has been provided in the Trustees' reports to the Court.

Supervisory Panel - Fees and Expenses

The COP provided \$3,000,000 for future compensation and expenses of the Supervisory Panel. Compensation and expenses of the Supervisory Panel are subject to approval by the Court on a monthly basis.

Status of Guidelines Notification

The COP provided \$400,000 for the costs of notification of the 2007 Amended Guidelines and one additional potential notification to BSCC heart valve implantees and physicians. The notification of the 2007 Amended Guidelines was completed.

Medical Expense Component - Valve Replacement Surgery Benefits

The COP provided \$2,300,000 for the potential future costs of the medical expense component for qualifying BSCC heart valve replacement surgeries. To date none of these funds have been required.

Class Registration Notice

In an effort to locate unregistered Class Members, a notice was published in seven foreign and thirteen U.S. newspapers. The notice was also placed on the domestic and foreign newswires. This program has been completed.

Unallocated per COP

The unallocated amount in the COP represents the remaining funds after the allocation of funds for specific purposes.

Additional Unallocated Funds at December 31, 2008.

At December 31, 2008 there were additional unallocated funds in the amount of \$3,661,200 principally representing interest income on the investment of funds in U.S. Treasury bills. The anticipated budget did not consider any income from invested funds, nor increases in expenses due to inflation, but considered that these items would offset. At the time the budget was prepared the interest rate on T-bills was as low as 1.008%, however, the interest rate subsequently rose to as high as 5.318%. The current interest rate is less than 1%. To date the expenses have been within the amounts budgeted.

Revision of Budgeted Amounts

After a determination is made as to any future research for the Supervisory Panel and as to whether or not there will be a BSCC heart valve diagnostic center established for testing Class Members, it may be appropriate to revise the budgets for all categories of expenses.

However, any budgeted amounts over actual expenses in these earlier years may be needed to cover future unknown contingencies, and to provide administration for an indefinite period of time which to some extent is anticipated to go beyond 20 years. It is estimated that there will be 2,300-2,900 60° BSCC heart valve implantees living in January 2025. There may also be a nominal number of 70° BSCC heart valve implantees living at that time.

For the years 2005 through 2009 the amounts are generally based upon the current level of expenses. For the time periods 2010 through 2014, and 2015 through 2024 the amounts are based upon an estimated level of expenses, since it is not known at this time if any diagnostic techniques may become available for routine use for Class Members.

The above does not consider any income from invested funds, nor increases in expenses due to inflation, but considers that these items would offset. Also, income from any patent or technology rights resulting from the Supervisory Panel's research is not considered.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Bowling-Pfizer Heart Valve Litigation Settlement Fund:

We have audited the accompanying statements of assets, liabilities, and fund balance — modified cash basis of the Bowling-Pfizer Heart Valve Litigation Settlement Fund (the "Fund") as of December 31, 2007 and 2006, and the related statements of income, expenses, and change in fund balance — modified cash basis, and of cash flows — modified cash basis for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Fund's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

As described in Note 2 to the financial statements, these financial statements were prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion, such financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, and fund balance of the Fund at December 31, 2007 and 2006, and its income, expenses, and change in fund balance, and its cash flows for the years then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 2.

NOTES TO MODIFIED CASH BASIS FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AS OF AND FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2007 AND 2006

1. ORGANIZATION AND GENERAL INFORMATION

The Bowling-Pfizer Heart Valve Litigation Settlement Fund (the "Fund") is the result of a settlement between Pfizer Inc. ("Pfizer") and its wholly owned subsidiary Shiley Incorporated ("Shiley") and a class of plaintiffs ("Plaintiffs") consisting of all persons who were alive on January 23, 1992, with a Bjork-Shiley Convexo-Concave (BSCC) heart valve still implanted, and their spouses on that date, except those persons who filed valid and timely requests for exclusion from the class.

The settlement required that Pfizer/Shiley pay a minimum of \$165 million to the Fund to settle the claims of the Plaintiffs. Certain provisions exist whereby Pfizer may be required to pay additional amounts to the Fund based on certain criteria as defined in the settlement. The minimum settlement is allocated between the "Patient Benefit Fund" (\$75 million) and the "Consultation Fund" (\$90 million).

The Patient Benefit Fund is to be used for: research and development of diagnostic techniques to identify implantees who may have a significant risk of strut fracture and to make such diagnostic techniques available to Plaintiff implantees; research concerning the characterization and/or reduction of the risks of valve replacement surgery; and payment of covered medical expenses for qualifying surgery to explant, due to the risk of strut fracture, a Plaintiff implantee's BSCC heart valve and replace it with another prosthetic heart valve.

The research activities of the Patient Benefit Fund are supervised by a Supervisory Panel (the "Panel"). The Panel, subject to Court approval, shall adopt and amend guidelines for valve replacement surgery. Also, the Panel will create a publicly accessible repository of information concerning the status of the research and the risks of valve fracture and of valve replacement. The Panel is made up of six members who are recognized scientific or medical experts and one member who is not a scientist or physician.

The Consultation Fund, initially \$80,000,000 for Plaintiff implantees, was intended to provide Plaintiff implantees with funds to obtain medical and psychological consultation as they deem best. It was to be divided equally among qualified Plaintiff implantees after paying or providing for fees and expenses to be paid out of the implantee portion of the Fund. In addition, \$10,000,000 was paid into the Fund which was paid, after fees and expenses, equally to all qualified Plaintiff spouses.

The terms of the settlement required Pfizer/Shiley to initially deposit \$12,500,000 into the Patient Benefit Fund. Additionally, beginning on the second anniversary of the final approval of the settlement, Pfizer/Shiley was required to make annual deposits into the Patient Benefit Fund of not less than \$6,250,000 until a total of \$75,000,000 had been paid.

Pfizer/Shiley paid \$80,000,000 to the Consultation Fund in 1992. In 1994, Pfizer/Shiley paid \$10,000,000 to the Consultation Fund and \$12,500,000 to the Patient Benefit Fund. Pfizer/Shiley also paid \$6,250,000 annually in 1996 through 2005 to the Patient Benefit Fund. Pfizer/Shiley made the last fund payment during 2005 to fulfill the \$165 million dollar settlement.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting — The Fund prepares its financial statements on the modified cash basis of accounting. Therefore, it records interest receivable for interest earned not yet received, taxes receivable (payable) (see Note 5), and accounts payable for expenses when incurred rather than when paid (modified cash basis). Under this basis all settlement payments by Pfizer/Shiley are recognized when received and all benefit payments and Plaintiffs' counsel fees and expenses are recognized when paid rather than when incurred. Also pension expense is recognized when paid rather than when incurred and no minimum liability is recorded.

Settlement Payments — All Consultation Fund claims submitted by each claimant were reviewed for qualification by the Fund and payments of qualified claims were approved by the Court.

Litigation Attorneys, Fees, and Expenses — Represents Court approved payments to Plaintiffs' counsel and to Public Citizen, Inc.

Other Assets — Other assets represent prepaid expenses for the Fund.

3. INVESTMENTS

Investments at December 31, 2007 and 2006, consist of short term (less than 6 month maturity) U.S. treasury bills and are carried at cost plus accrued interest. The market value of such investments was approximately \$22,297,000 and \$23,207,000, at December 31, 2007 and 2006, respectively.

4. OPERATING LEASES

The Fund leases its office facilities under an agreement classified as an operating lease from an unrelated party. Total future minimum lease payments due are as follows:

5. TAX STATUS

For Federal income tax purposes, the Fund is treated as a taxable designated settlement fund under Section 468(B) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Fund is required to pay taxes on the excess of interest income earned over expenses incurred for the administration of the Fund. The settlement payments by Pfizer/Shiley, benefit payments, and payment of Plaintiffs' counsel fees and expenses are not taxable transactions.

In March 1996, the Fund requested a ruling from the Internal Revenue Service regarding the taxability of the Fund and the deductibility of certain disbursements from the Fund. In January 1997, the Fund received a favorable ruling regarding these issues and, consequently, recorded no tax provision for 2007 or 2006.

6. PENSION PLAN

In October 2004, the Fund adopted a defined benefit pension plan (the "Plan") which became effective January 1, 2004. All employees of the Fund participate in the Plan. The Fund's cash basis contribution to the Plan was approximately \$220,000 and \$196,000 for the years ended December 31, 2007 and 2006. During 2007, the Fund approved the termination of the Plan. In February 2007, the Fund contributed \$220,000 as a final contribution to the Plan and in September 2007, the assets held by the Plan were rolled over into individual retirement accounts held by the Plan participants.

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
